Summary

SUBSTITUTE HOUSE BILL 1223

"The uniform electronic recordation of custodial interrogations act."

Requirements:

- (1) A custodial interrogation, including the giving of any required warning, advice of the rights of the individual being questioned, and the waiver of any rights by the individual, must be recorded electronically in its entirety if the interrogation subject is juvenile or if the interrogation relates to a felony crime.
- (2) Law doesn't require the use of body worn cameras, recordings could be accomplished using other methods.

(a) Most all "other methods" require significant effort, create investigative disruptions and extra challenges on officers, citizens, victims, support staff and the COK Information Services to store the digital content.
- (3) Essentially an unfunded mandate for Washington State law enforcement.
- (4) KPD will present on this topic and options we have researched to continue to serve our community at the highest level while complying with the new law.

Substitute House Bill No. 1223

- ▣ Substitute House Bill No. 1223 requires law enforcement video/audio record all juvenile interrogations and adult felony interrogations.
- ▣ Effective January 1, 2022
- ▣ Can be accomplished without Body Worn Camera's, most options are:
 - Arduous
 - Distracting
 - Inefficient
 - ▣ Separate report if not recorded
 - IT Services = digital media storage

Substitute House Bill No. 1223

- ▣ Body Worn Cameras (BWC's) integrate more seamlessly into current practices, provides compliance with enhancement.
- ▣ Simple, efficient and effective.
- ▣ Vehicle Cameras - supplement to BWC's.
 - Vehicle Cameras include prisoner compartment audio/video.
- ▣ Integrated signal technologies to activate all devices at the scene.

Substitute House Bill No. 1223

- ▣ Other Considerations:
 - Increased public records requests
 - ▣ Staffing needs related to public records
 - Support from IS
 - ▣ Minor assistance with hardware service docks
- ▣ Benefits:
 - Available documentation of contacts
 - Safety/Security
 - ▣ Automatic recording and GPS are just two examples.
- ▣ Evidence.com – Unlimited storage
 - No IS support – potentially integrates with RMS?

Substitute House Bill No. 1223

▣ Unfunded Mandate

- HB 1223 is an unfunded mandate creating a paradox for Washington Law Enforcement.
 - ▣ Paradox = lacking BWC's will create noticeable limitations for law enforcement.
 - More difficult to prosecute and hold offenders accountable
- Increased staff time to accommodate PDR's
 - ▣ Software available to streamline redaction
- Grant Opportunities
 - ▣ Very competitive

The Axon Opportunity

- ▣ Axon Core Pricing
 - BWC's, Taser 7's and Vehicles in one bid on state contract
 - Five year contract
 - ▣ Installments
 - ▣ Hardware refreshment
- ▣ Tasers replacement already planned
 - 92 of our 97 current Taser X26's are 5-6 years old
 - ▣ Nearing end of service life
 - Taser 7 is the current best option for KPD
 - ▣ Dual probe less lethal option – X26 was single probe
 - ▣ New technology = more effective
 - ▣ Signal technology

BJA FY 21 Body-Worn Camera Policy and Implementation Program to Support Law Enforcement Agencies

- ▣ **Due date:** 07/26/2021
- ▣ **Match requirement:** 50% (cash or in-kind) – we can do in-kind for the policy development piece as well as the storage, personnel to support the program, redaction cost, PDR, etc.
- ▣ **Funding cap:** \$2,000 per BWC (no award over \$2,000,000)
- ▣ **Timeline:** 36 months (started 10/01/2021)
- ▣ **Goals of program:**

To support the purchase of BWC's for LE and ensure they are deployed as part of a comprehensive body-worn camera program that embodies evidenced-based and problem-solving approaches.

To achieve comprehensive approaches, agencies should allow broad stakeholder input into program development, develop plans to integrate BWC technology within the agency's operational framework, enhance mutual trust between officers and the community, and promote organizational efficiency.

Specific Objectives and Deliverables are explained in the solicitation (pg. 7) Specific Narrative requirements outlined on pgs. 10-11
- ▣ **OJP Priority Areas:**

OJP will give priority consideration in award decisions to applications that demonstrate ways to advance one or more of the following areas:

 - Promotes civil rights
 - Increases access to justice
 - Supports crime victims
 - Protects the public from crime and evolving threats
 - Builds trust between LE and the community
- ▣ **Requirements:** Commit to developing a comprehensive BWC implementation program (details provided).

Cost

- ▣ Taser, BWC and Vehicle Camera for every Patrol/CAT vehicle and commissioned line officer/investigator
 - \$1,478,482.85
 - ▣ Installment options
 - Year 1 = \$300,285.77
 - Year 2 = \$294,549.27
 - Year 3 = \$294,549.27
 - Year 4 = \$294,549.27
 - Year 5 = \$294,549.27
- ▣ FTE (1) to support Public Records
 - Wage and benefits = \$82,000 annually

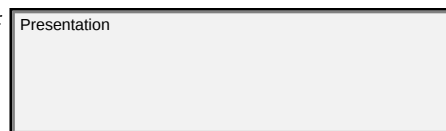

Key Schedule Milestones

April 2021 – Construct emergency access to Bofer Canyon Rd. Relocate Bofer Canyon Rd to east. Relocate BPUD and City utilities.

September 1 – Divert US395 traffic to east bypass route at Ridgeline. (1 northbound and 2 southbound lanes)

September – April 2022 – construct undercrossing of US395 and southbound on/off ramps

May 1, 2022 – Move traffic back onto US395 main route.

May 1 – September (2022) – remove bypass, construct northbound on/off ramps, additional northbound 395 lane, Ridgeline/ Zintel roundabout, US395/Hildebrand intersection expansion and new traffic signal work.

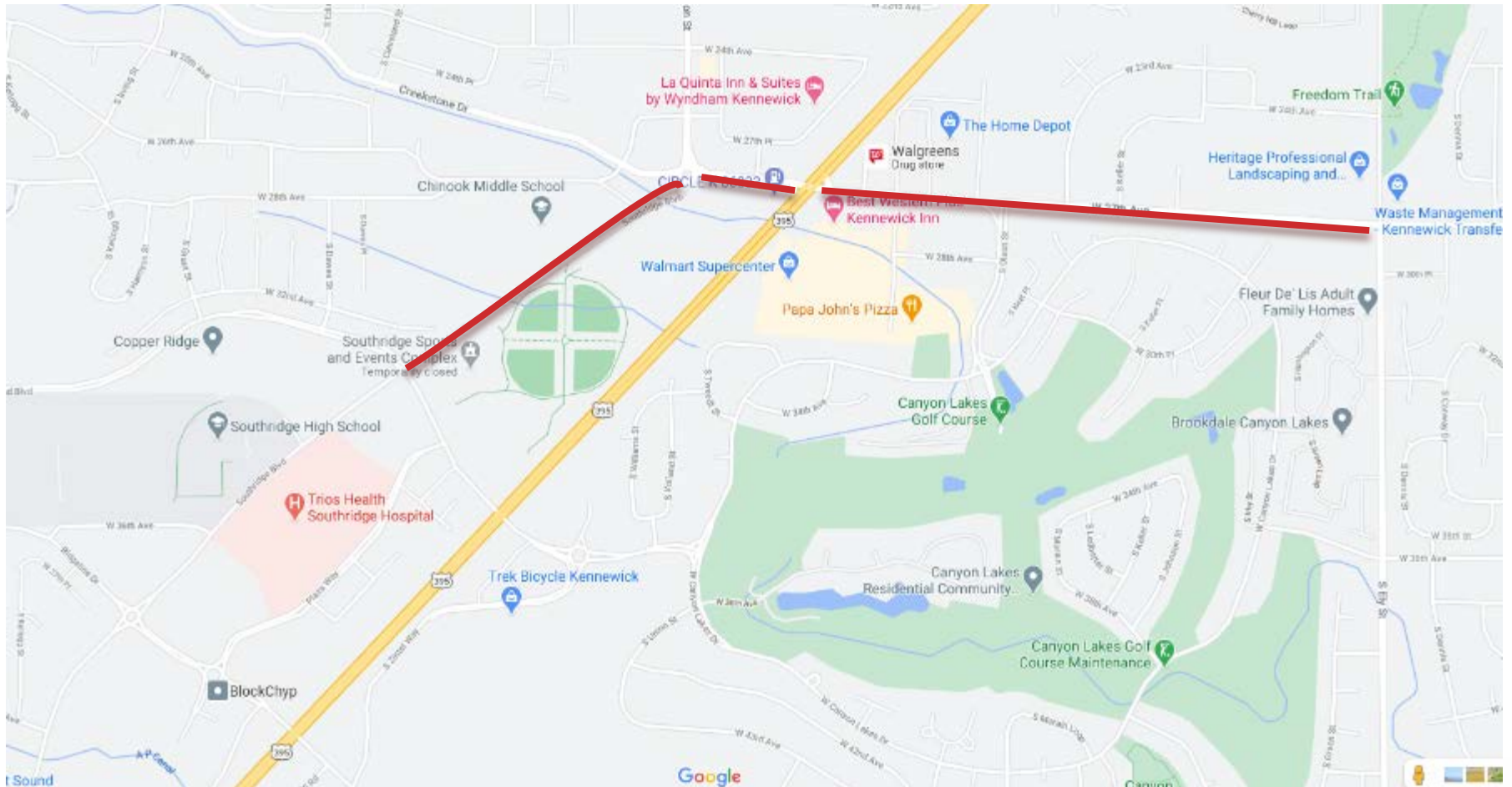


2021 City-Wide Asphalt Overlay

- Project Scope and Limits
 - *This project is annually budgeted for and typically consists of two to three major arterial roadway overlays. For this year, the following streets are planned for milling and overlaying:*
 - *W. 27th Ave. (Union to SR-395)*
 - *W. 27th Ave. (SR-395 to Ely St.)*
 - *Southridge Blvd. (Hildebrand Blvd. to W. 27th Ave. RAB)*
 - *Project will also include upgrading ADA ramps at intersections, new striping and signage.*
 - *Contract awarded to Central Washington Asphalt*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Anticipate construction to start around end of June/early July of this year.*

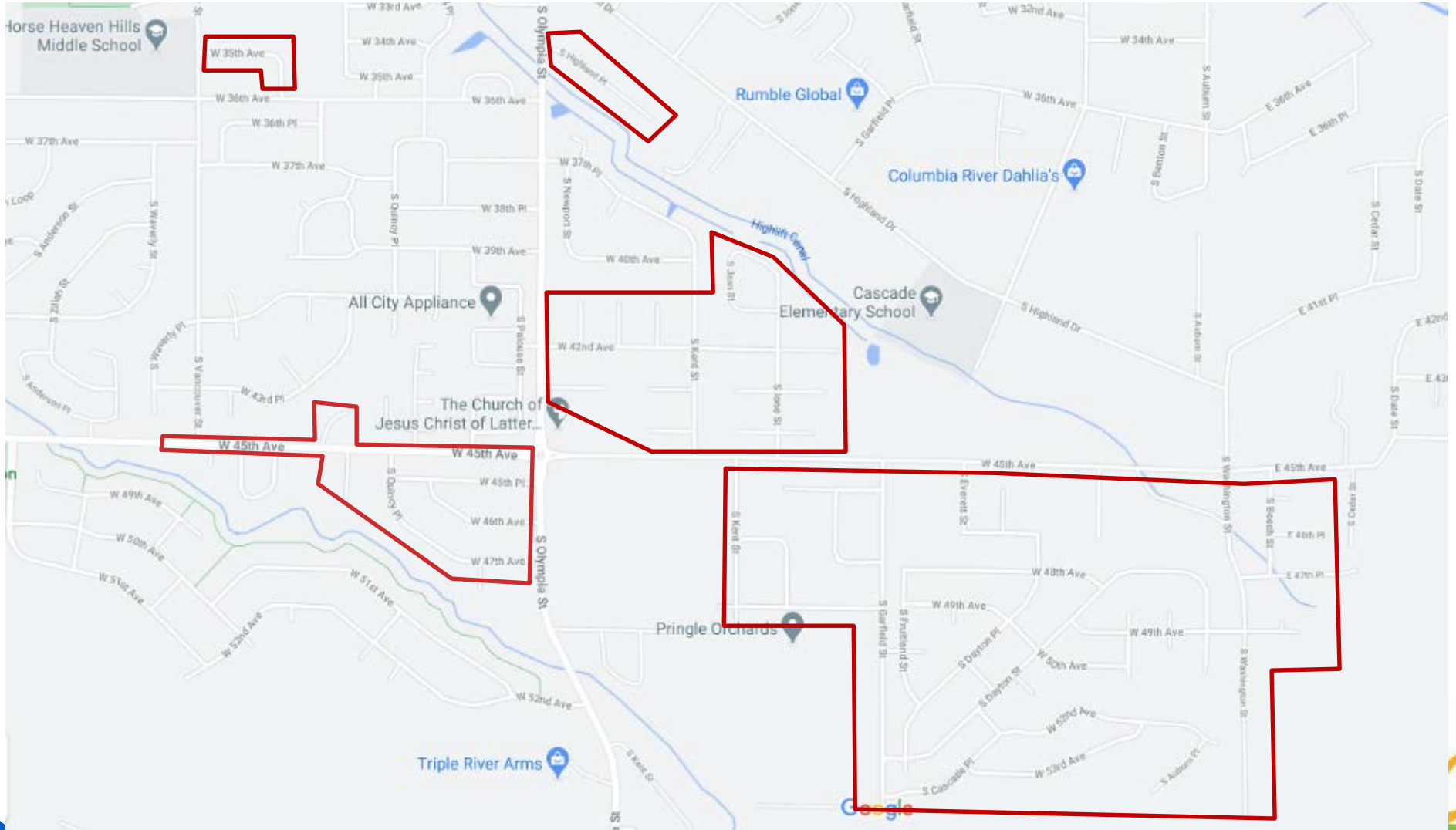


2021 City-Wide BST

- Project Scope and Limits
 - *This project consists of the application of bituminous surface treatment (BST) seal coat of paved arterial streets within the Kennewick city limits. A quickset fog seal will be applied following the post-BST application.*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Construction in progress with completion no later than July 23, 2021.*
 - *Contract was awarded in December to Tommer Construction of Ephrata, WA.*

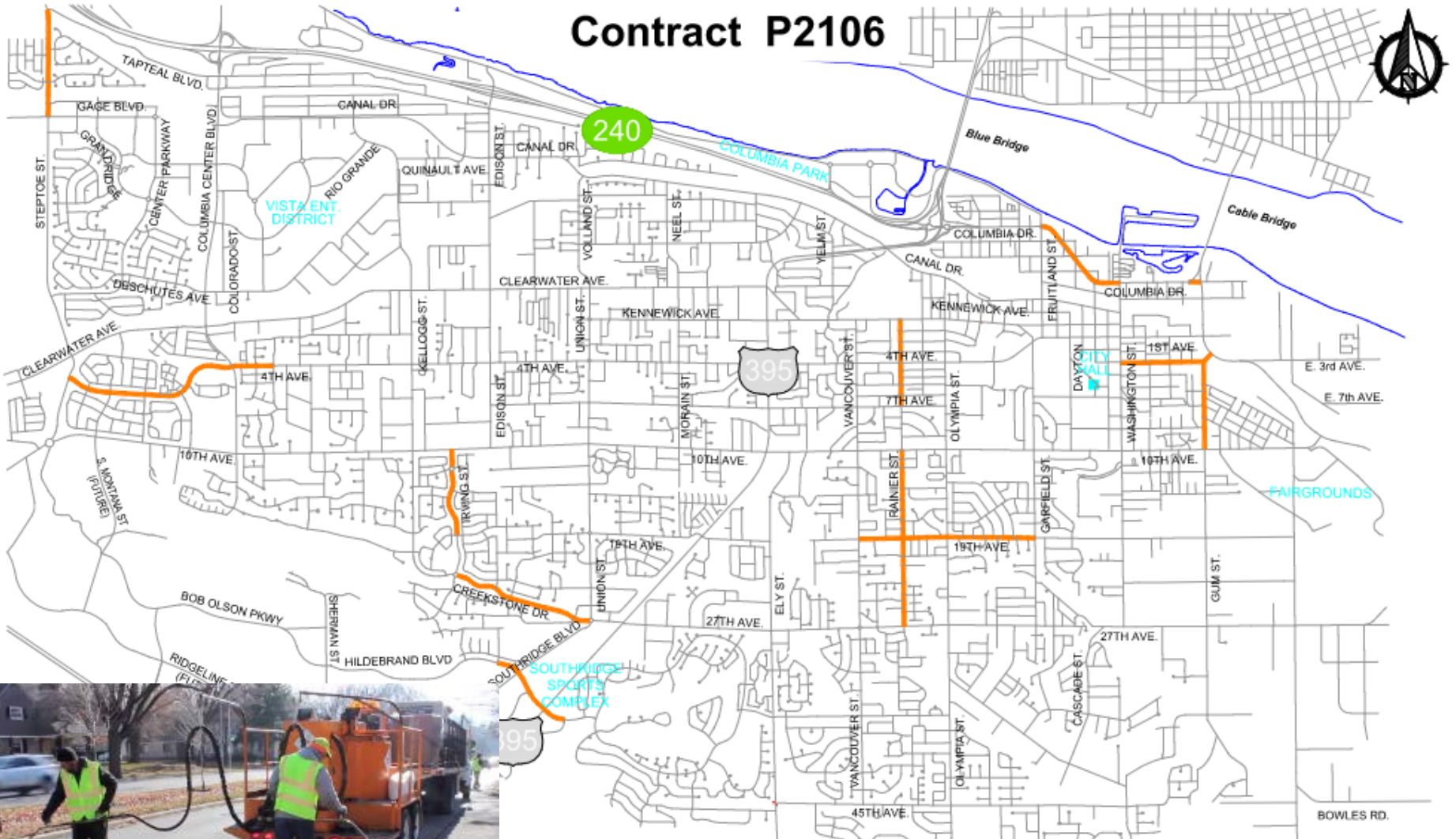


2021 Crackseal Project

- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Project consists of the application of almost 40 Tons of rubberized asphalt on the major arterial City streets as part of the City's ongoing preventive maintenance program.*
 - *Parks & Facilities and Public Works have teamed up on this contract, to include several facility parking lots and park pathways in the project scope.*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Contractor, Pavement Surface Control, was selected off of the Small Works Roster.*
 - *Work has been put on pause due to high temperatures.*

Creekstone Settlement Repair

- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Several streets within the Creekstone Subdivision have been experiencing settlement over the trenches over the last several years, and in particular over the sewer lines. This project will implement an assessment from a geotechnical study which recommended that the existing backfill material over the settled sewer lines be removed and replaced with compacted Crushed Surfacing Top Course.*
- Project Schedule
 - *Contractor, Double J Excavation, has been selected for this work using the Small Works Roster.*
 - *Project is currently underway.*

2021 City Safety Selections

Photometric Data Collection & Survey

- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Photometric data collection and study to determine illumination standards for Principal and Minor Arterials with ADTs greater than 12,000 vehicles per day.*
- Financing
 - *Successful in receiving \$54,000 through the Federal Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP)*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Consultant solicitation this Summer.*
 - *Complete study this Winter.*



2021 City Safety Selections

Pedestrian Crossing Improvements

- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Install pedestrian crossing improvements including Rectangular Rapid Flashing Beacons (RRFBs), pedestrian refuge islands, and pavement markings and fifteen (15) locations City-wide.*
- Financing
 - *Successful in receiving \$855,300 through the Federal Highway Safety Improvement Program (HSIP)*
 - *If the construction phase is authorized by April 30, 2023, then the construction phase is eligible for 100% funding (no local match required).*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Start in-house design this Summer.*
 - *Complete construction this Winter/Spring 2022.*

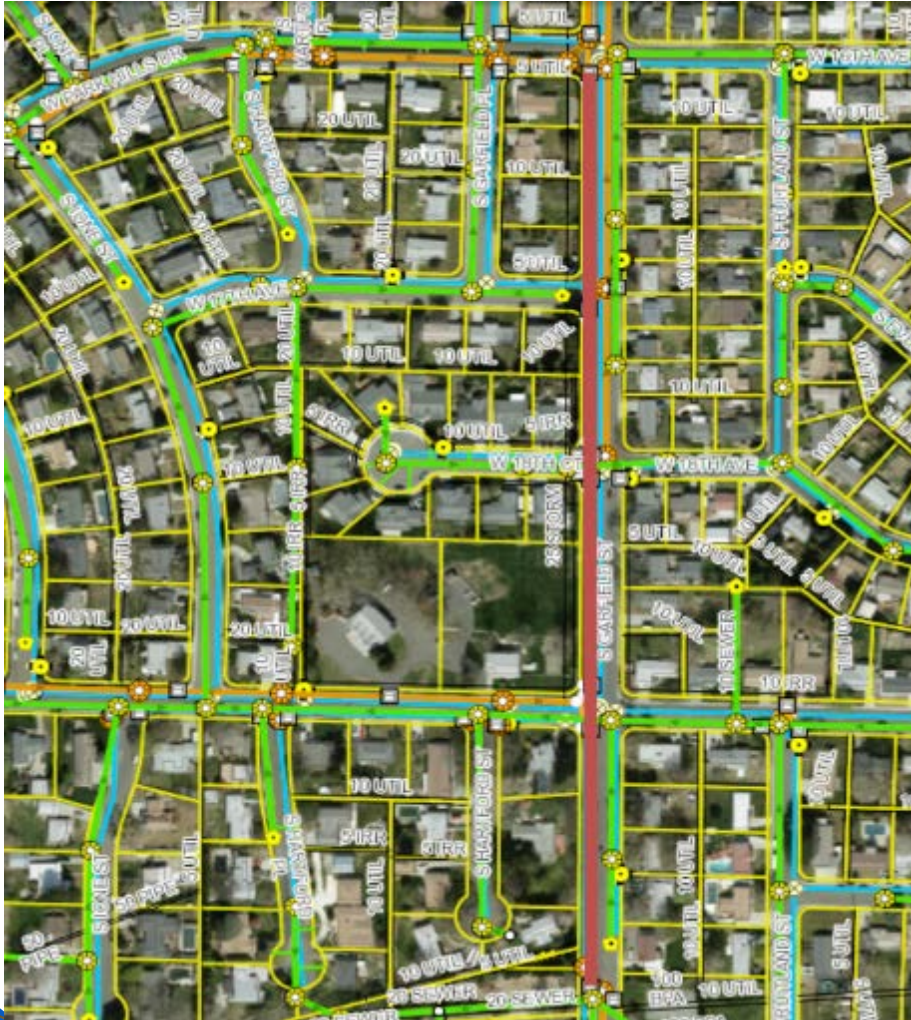


Garfield St. Storm Drain Extension – Blackberry Canyon to Park Hills Drive

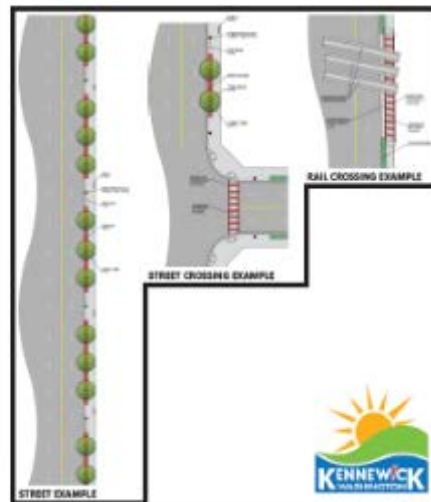
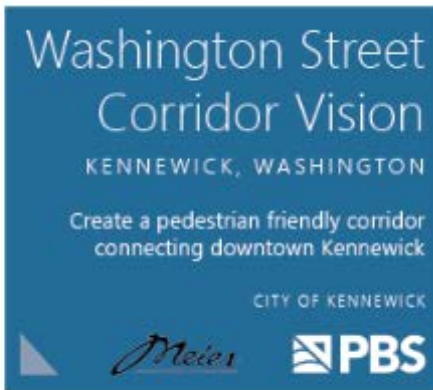
- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Project will pipe the storm outfall flows from Blackberry Canyon to Park Hills Drive, eventually flowing into the Frog Pond off 10th Avenue. This will involve installing a 36" dia. pipe within the west side ditch along Garfield.*
 - *Contract has been awarded to Allstar Construction Group of Richland.*
- Project Schedule
 - *Construction this Summer of 2021.*

Washington St. Corridor



- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Construct street-scape improvements for a bike & pedestrian link to Clover Island and the new wine venues.*
 - *\$500K Complete Streets Grant*
 - *\$500K Port of Kennewick*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Awarded to Ray Poland & Sons*
 - *Currently under construction with completion this July, 2021*



Steptoe St. & Gage Blvd. Intersection Improvements

- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Project consists of constructing double left turn lanes and single right turn lanes at all approaches (where not existing). Also will eliminate split phase timing.*
 - *Joint project with the City of Richland.*
 - *All phases of project were awarded Federal funding.*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Design and ROW phases currently underway.*
 - *Estimated construction in late 2022.*
 - *ROW and easement purchase will be required for this project.*

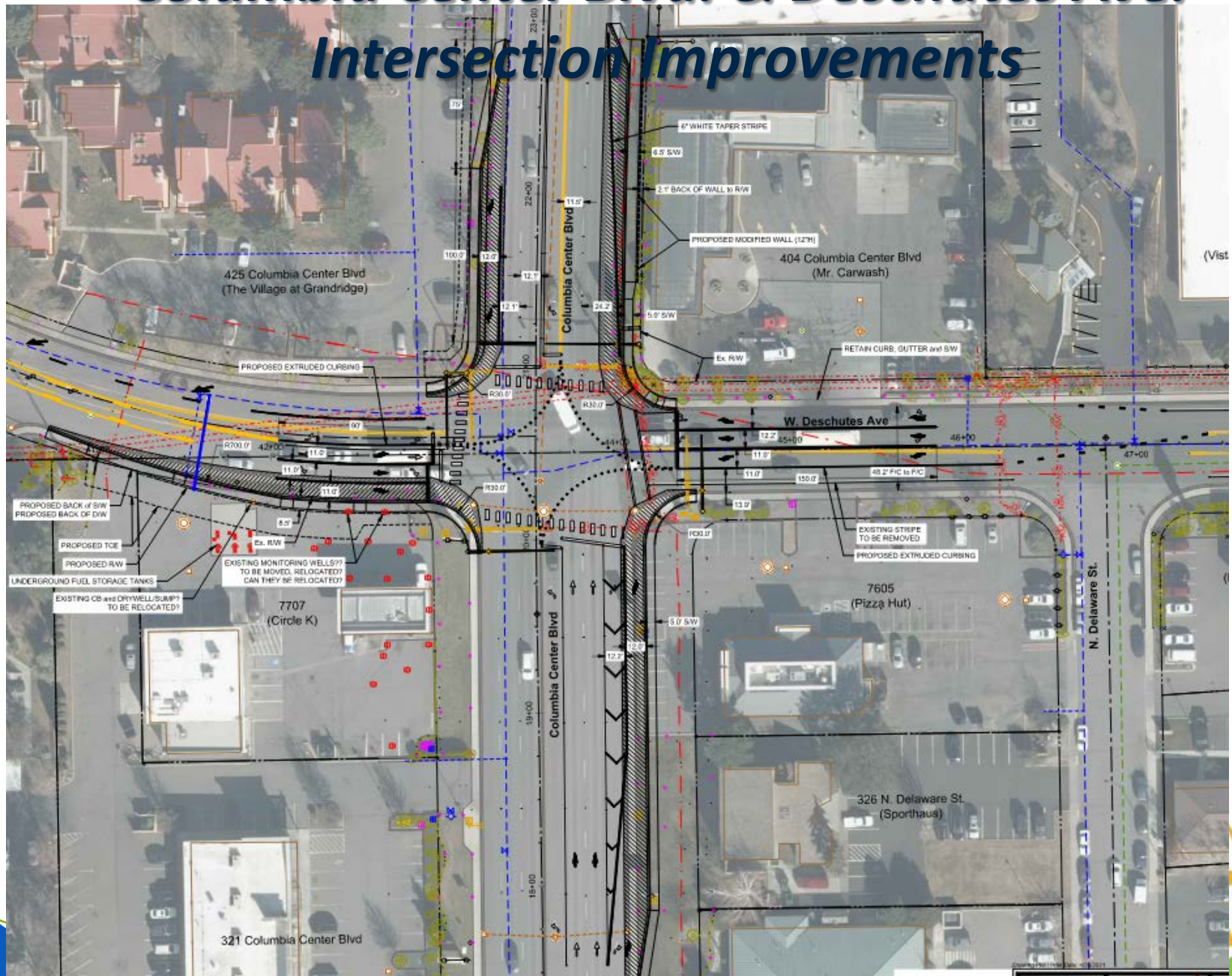


Columbia Center Blvd. & Deschutes Ave. Intersection Improvements

- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Project consists of constructing a right-turn lane for added turning capacity for west-bound traffic turning north from Deschutes Ave. and onto Columbia Center Blvd. In addition, proposed work will be in preparation for extending a third lane for north and south-bound traffic on Columbia Center Blvd.*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Design currently underway.*
 - *ROW purchase will be required for this project.*
 - *Construction phase not yet funded.*



Columbia Center Blvd. & Deschutes Ave. Intersection Improvements

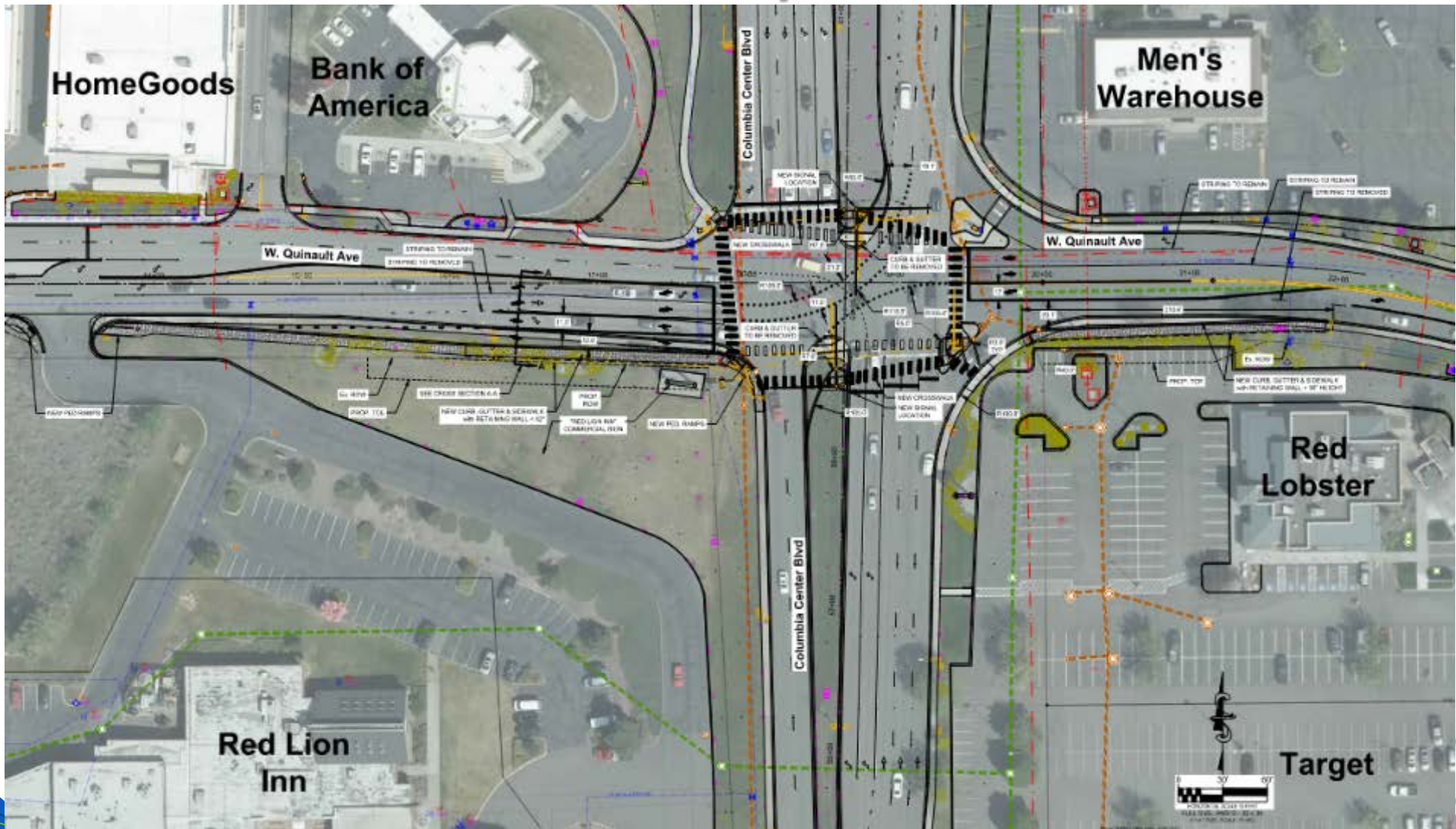


Columbia Center Blvd. & Quinault Ave. Intersection Improvements

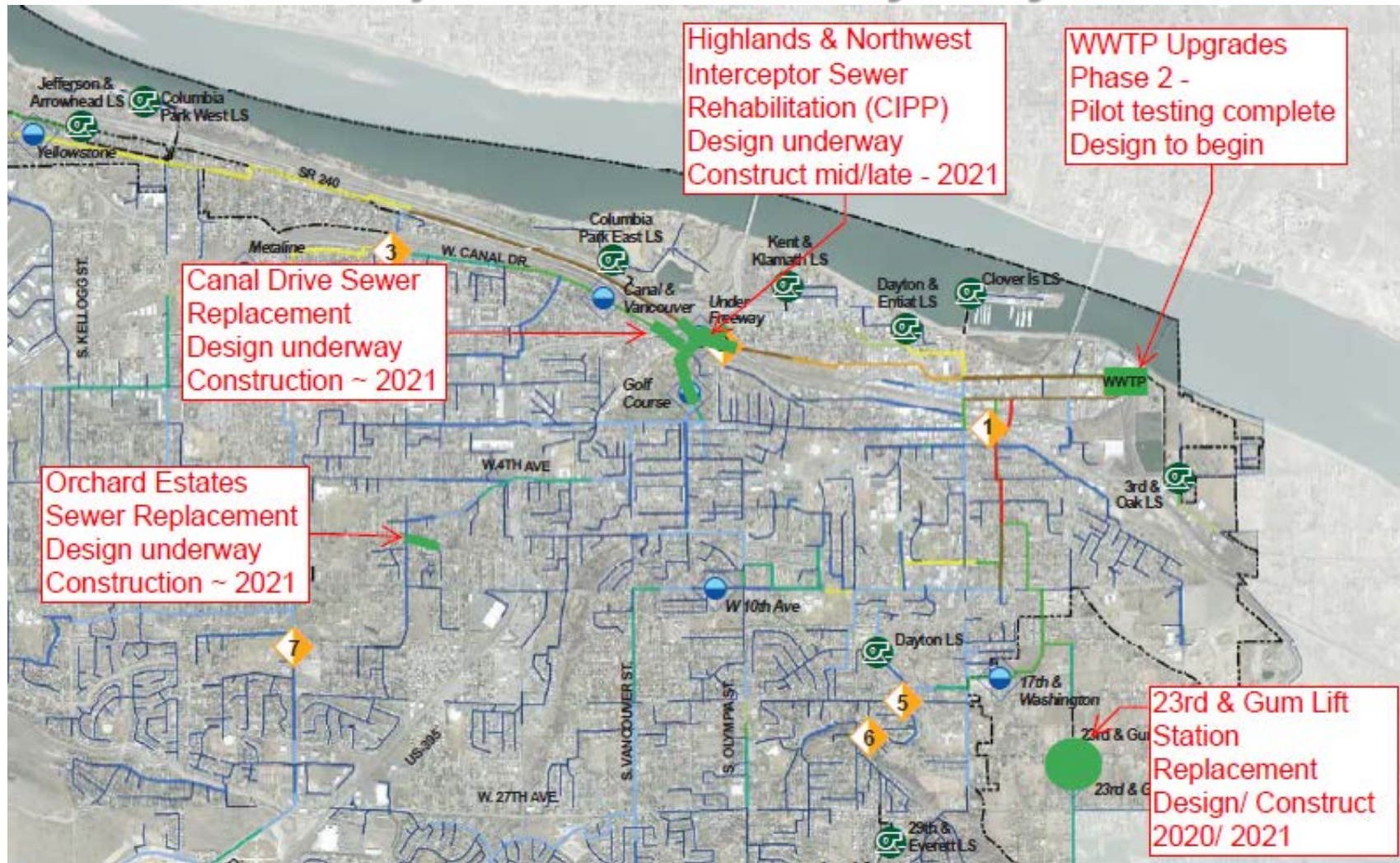
- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Project consists of constructing a second left-turn lane for added turning capacity for east-bound traffic turning north from Quinault Ave. and onto Columbia Center Blvd. A second through-lane is also being provided for west-bound traffic on Quinault Ave. Design will include preparation for extending a third lane south of the intersection for north and south-bound traffic on Columbia Center Blvd.*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Design currently underway.*
 - *ROW purchase will be required for this project.*
 - *Construction phase not yet funded.*

Canal Drive Sewer Replacement

- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Installation of a new 12-inch dia. sewer line down Canal Drive from the US 395 bridge 600 LF eastward to replace failing concrete line on the south side of roadway.*
 - *Emergency repairs were completed in December 2019, enabling this project to be designed under non-emergency conditions.*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Project was awarded to Sharpe & Preszler Const.*
 - *Estimated construction is late May/early June of this year.*





Highlands & Northwest Interceptor Sewer Rehabilitation (CIPP)

- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Using cured-in-place place (CIPP) trenchless methods, reline approximately 3,500 linear feet of sewer interceptors.*
 - *North across Zintel Golf Course (Highlands Interceptor) & under US 395 near the UPRR tracks (Northwest Interceptor)*
 - *Spray line all manholes with H2S protective coating*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Currently in design phase.*
 - *Estimated construction is mid-2021.*

Orchard Estates Sewer Replacement

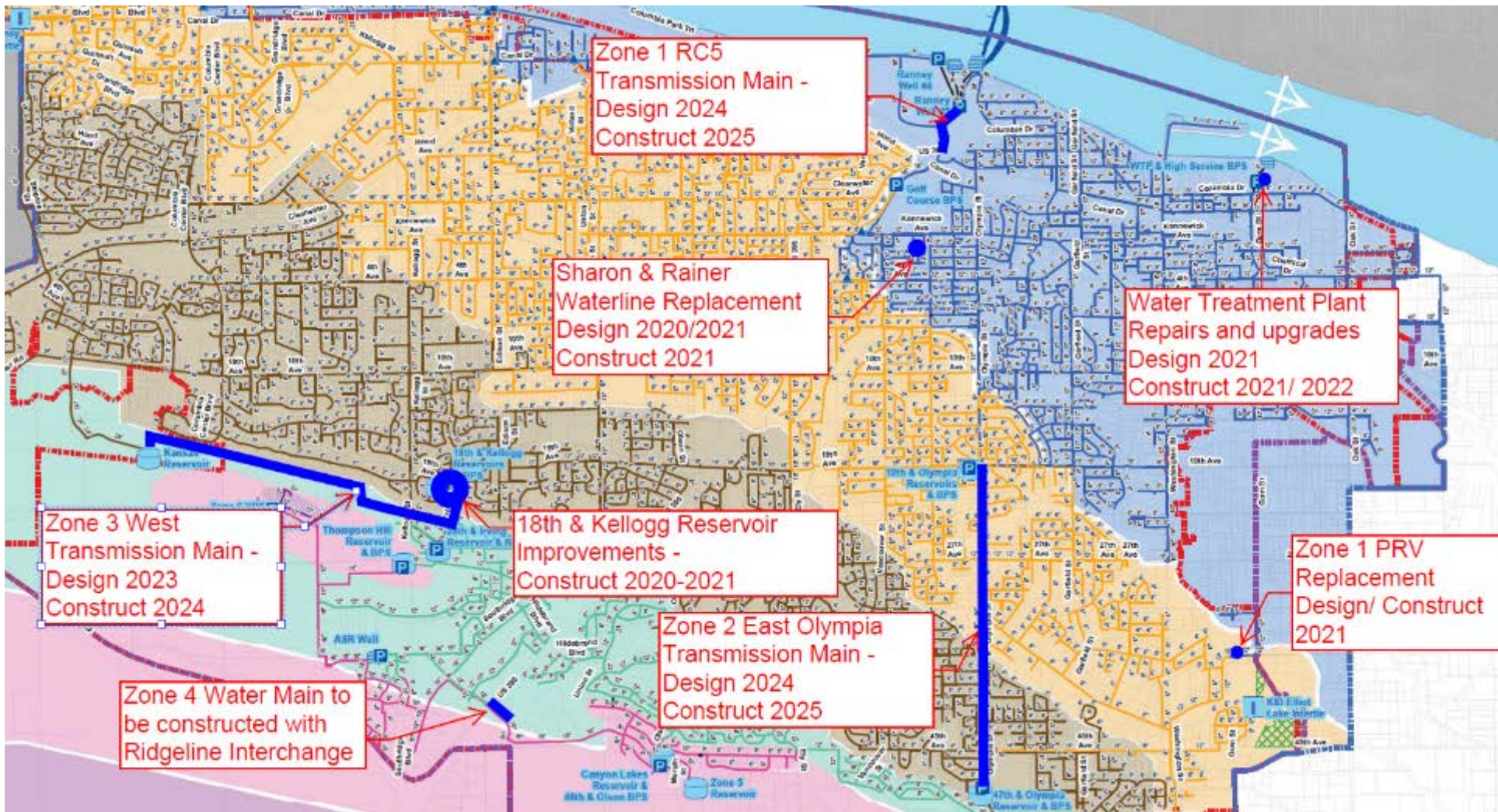
- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Replace ~700 linear feet of existing sewer and replace in the same general alignment*
 - *Existing sewer is flat, bellies, and root intrusion*
 - *New sewer will have an increased slope*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Contractor selected off the Small Works Roster.*
 - *Estimated construction is May/June of this year.*

18th & Kellogg Reservoir Replacement

- *Replace structurally deficient 10 MG reservoir with new 6 MG reservoir and booster pump station with provisions for a second future twin reservoir for capacity and redundancy.*
- *Construction Underway 2020-2022*
 - *(18-24 months)*



Zone 3 West Transmission Main

- Project Scope
 - The Zone 3 West Transmission Main project will construct a dedicated 20" water main between the new booster pump station at 18th and Kellogg to the Kansas Reservoir.
 - The City hired HDR to perform an alignment study to assess the best route between the new pump station and the existing Kansas reservoir. Below is the preferred alignment.



P1932 Zone 1 PRV Replacement

- Project Scope and Limits
 - *Replace existing Pressure Reducing Valve and vault for the Zone 1 - 36th Ave. PRV Station.*
- Estimated Project Schedule
 - *Complete Design in Fall/Winter of this year.*
 - *Construct in 2021.*

P2018 Sharron/Rainier Waterline Project

- **Project Scope and Limits**

- *Project will include abandoning an existing leaky 3" steel line that resides in an easement in the backyard of the residents on Rainier and Sharron, just south of Kennewick Ave. Improvements will include installing a new water main in Sharron St. and W. 3rd Ave., and moving the water meters out from the back yards to the front yards of the residents.*

- **Estimated Project Schedule**

- *Complete Design and anticipate advertisement around July of this year.*
- *Construct late this year.*

- Deferred Maintenance CIP Budget: \$145,000
- Ongoing through 2021/22

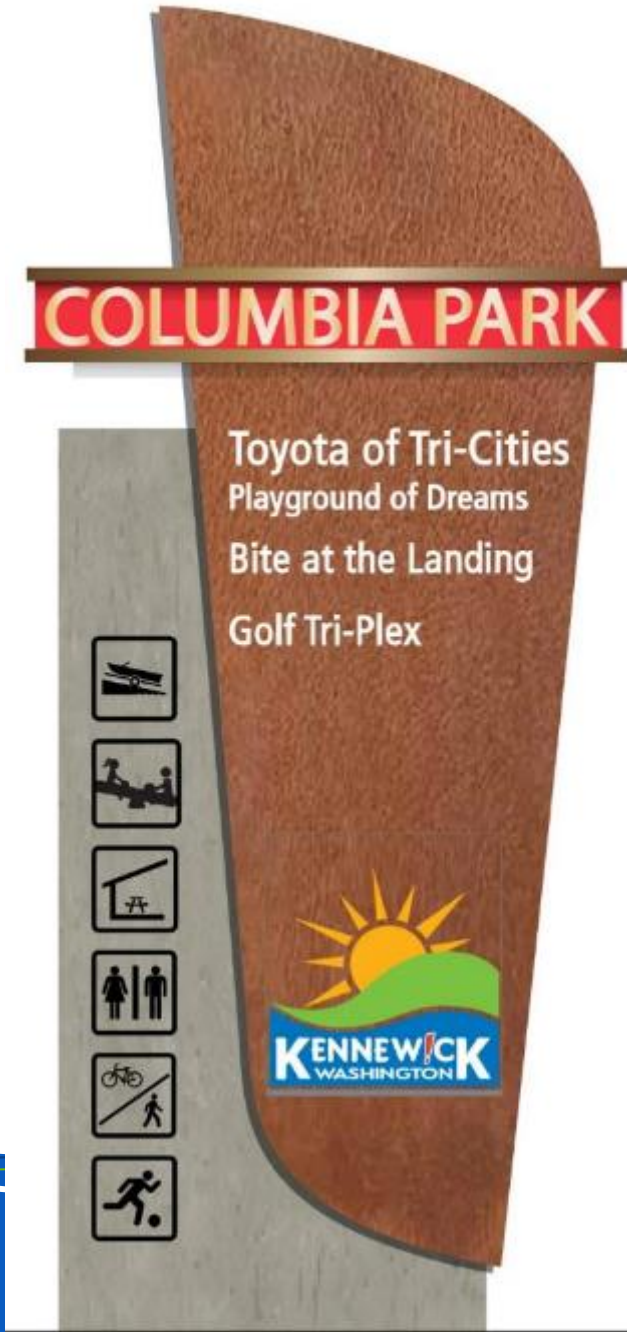
